



States across the nation are leading the way to ensure more children—especially those from low-income families—have access to high-quality early learning and care from birth through age five. And much of the progress at the state and local level has been made possible by strong partnerships with the federal government aimed at expanding access, increasing quality, and more. In Florida (FL), over 291,000 children have access to quality early learning and care through state and federal funding. This abbreviated overview provides a glimpse of the early childhood education opportunities that exist in Florida, including those made possible with federal funding in fiscal year 2015.



A TIMELINE OF STATE LEADERSHIP: EARLY CHILDHOOD EDUCATION IN FLORIDA

2002

State passes a constitutional amendment requiring prekindergarten access for all four-year-olds.

2011

Florida Early Learning and Development Standards for Four-Year-Olds is approved by State Board of Education, to be implemented in 2018-2019 school year. 2013

All providers are required to administer Florida VPK assessment at beginning and end of each school year.



Florida Voluntary Prekindergarten Program (VPK) begins operating, serving approximately 100,000 children.

2005

VPK enrollment reached 175,000 children.

2012

Teaching Strategies GOLD is utilized by all VPK providers to assess children's development in domains not covered by the VPK assessment.

HIGH-QUALITY EARLY EDUCATION: EDUCARE OF MIAMI-DADE

- Educare is a network of high-quality early childhood education programs across
 America serving low-income children from birth through age five through public private partnerships in which funding and governance includes the local schools,
 Head Start and Early Head Start, private philanthropy, and other community and
 private sector support.
- Currently serves 116 children birth through age five and their families. Since 2007, Educare of Miami-Dade has served 14,915 local children.
- Serves as a demonstration school for United Way Center for Excellence in Early Education, which models proven best practices and shares those practices with parents, educators, child care providers, and other organizations. Educare of Miami-Dade has better prepared 32,525 early education professionals, and helped 1,280 early education centers and family child care homes improve services since 2007.
- Since 2007, has advocated with partner organizations to raise \$100 million in public funding to benefit young children in the state.
- Produces professional development webinars on early childhood education topics to encourage continued learning for early care and education professionals.
